The whole thing was wondrous - I had no idea what we would see, and everything was more beautiful than the scene before. Paying \$450/pp premium for "Unobstructed View" gave us an ample cabin with a large window, and what we didn't spend on upgrading to a veranda stateroom took us in an 8-seater plane all around Denali on a rare cloudless day - strictly sensational! Apparently only 30% of tourists get to glimpse Denali at all, and only 5% get to see her on a clear day.

Ketchikan, Juneau and Skagway are tourist towns, thriving on tourist taste and dollars, but the day trips outside of town are remarkable. Glacier Bay and College Fjord are breathtaking; Anchorage and Fairbanks are just there, though Anchorage has a fine accessible museum that's well worth an afternoon. Again with the exception of a couple days on ship when the weather was cool and gray, and a pall of wildfire smoke in Fairbanks we had sunshine and pleasant temps the entire time.

If you've been tempted to do it, give in!!! Holland America does an overall good job of herding cats (i.e. keeping tabs on 2000+ passengers - this from a person who has been decrying the size and intrusion of cruise ships for 40+ years), and the ratio of natural wonders to man made achievements is about 99:01. I'd definitely recommend going south to north; everything just got better and better every day, so I'd guess it gets a bit less awe-inspiring each day going north to south.

Stay tuned - I'd love to see if I can top myself at this time next year! Meanwhile, my best to all, wherever this finds you!
